## June severe weather warning Omnibus results

At the beginning of July a weather question on the TNS Omnibus Survey was asked about people's response to the warnings of severe weather which were issued during the last two weeks of June (23/24<sup>th</sup> June & 30<sup>th</sup>/1<sup>st</sup> July).

The research found that national awareness of the warnings had been high with 91% of the UK aware of the severe weather warnings. Respondents in London were least aware (85%) whilst those in regions most severely effected by the weather; North East, Yorks & Humberside and East Midlands, were the most aware (96%).

In regions most severely effected by the weather (North East, Yorks & Humberside and East Midlands), over half said the warnings had not applied to their specific area. Of those to whom the warnings did apply 43% said they paid more attention to weather forecasts, 22% stayed at home or changed their plans, while 29% heard the warning but took no notice.
